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

And We Still "Stand Pat" for the People



The fact is that the Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company with a total capitalization of \$52,500,000, can not expect the citizens of Milwaukee to be its absolute slaves forever because a city mayor and a number of thievish aldermen had been bought up in 1900.

The fact is that even though we must pay tribute to the Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company, alias Milwaukee Light, Heat and Traction Company, alias North American Company, alias North American Securities Trust-we at least want reasonably good street car service.

Every cross town line adds \$114,464 to the capital of the company's value in actual saving-not counting the new business at all-according to the report of the railroad commission.

The demands of the Socialists are very modest and very reasonable. We want to avoid any fight or litigation with the street car company if we can possibly do so. We must be willing to be punished for permitting Dave Rose and a lot of crooks to rule the city of Milwaukee in former years.

But Mr. John I. Beggs' company is getting its extension for nothing. trial exploitation. His company will be able to save and to make a great deal of money every year-therefore why should not the city get some concession?

All we want in exchange is a transfer system that will enable a person to get from a starting point within the city limits and within the lines of the Milwaukee Electric Railway Company for one fare. The Socialist aldermen are not demanding a double transfer. That is the way Mr. Beggs is putting it. One transfer will be sufficient if Mr. Beggs arranges transfer points accordingly.

Furthermore, we desire the abolition of the arbitrary rule of the company compelling every passenger to ask for a transfer when paying fare or to lose the right to a transfer. The company would not lose any money by extending the transfer privilege, under proper regulations. Mr. Beggs is sticking to a petty bourgeois butcher point of view on this question.

We also demand that the Milwaukee street car company remove the snow from its tracks in winter and not pile it up mountain high on each side of the tracks, thereby obstructing traffic.

Now are these demands unreasonable? Would the granting of these concessions really bankrupt the company within two years as Mr. John I. Beggs claims? The Milwaukee Northern is doing a flourishing business by giving eight tickets for a quarter.

However, we will predict that Mr. John I. Beggs' company will go into bankruptcy sooner or later. The total capitalization of the Milwaukee Light, Heat and Traction Company and of the Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company amounts to \$117,500,000. Of this capitalization, \$48,917,000 is already outstanding. We are paying interest and dividends on this every year, although it is largely hot water and hot air.



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

The Municipal Cost Keeping System for Milwaukee

In the water department, for example, the cost-keeping system tells of the cost of furnishing 100 gallons of water-the labor cost, salary cost,

and reduces it to a common basis of the standard unit of output.

management cost, depreciation cost, etc., per 100 gallons of water, In the public works department, it tells about the actual cost of a square yard of a given kind of pavement-the labor cost, the cost of management, cost of material, etc., per square yard of a certain kind of pavement.

In this way the responsible head of a department can see at a plance just what every item of cost has been—or whether the contractors are taking undue advantage of the city-or where the leaks and losses are to be looked

for—and where improvement is being made.

This cost-keeping system is the FOUNDATION of the BUSINESS
MANAGEMENT of all the MODERN TRUSTS—and of every up-to-date manufacturing establishment.

With a scientific investigation-not from the books but from the actual work of the department-the same system can be applied to every depart-

Then, if the city will issue a bulletin at the end of each month showing the cost of every department for a month compared with the preceding month-and explaining the whys and wherefores-and get out charts and diagrams so that every official or any citizen can see at a glance what is going on—it will place our city administration on a more perfect basis of efficiency than has ever been done anywhere in this country.

This scientific investigation should include the question of DIRECT EMPLOYMENT AND THE ABOLITION OF THE CONTRACT SYSTEM WHEREVER POSSIBLE.

A cost-keeping system, carried out in the way indicated above, will form the basis and the essential part of many OTHER municipal reforms.

Of course it will require an economic investigation in the field rather than an accountant's audit in the office.

The expense will be considerable. Owing to the lack of funds, we have only secured \$5,000 for a start. And the greatest difficulty so far is to find the right kind of a man to undertake and carry out this work at the salary

In order to make the work more telling, it should be carried back over the past years for comparison. However, the cost-keeping system once established, will be something
