COMMITTEE NOW DECIDING FATE OF I. S. U. FAKER

COAST PORTS DEMANDING SCHARRENBERG BE KICKED OUT Fails to Show Up MAY BE SUSPENDED FOR NINETY-NINE YEAR PERIOD

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Practical steps toward kicking the notorious labor faker, Paul Scharrenberg, out of the International Seamen's Union were well under way yesterday with the convening of the trial committee appointed at the membership meeting last Monday night. The committee continued its session today and is expected to have a decision ready for next Monday's meeting.

Delegates arrived from the local unions of Seattle, Portland and San Pedro, each presenting new evidence to support the ouster. Many locals up and down the coast, which have already passed resolutions asking for Scharrenberg's resignation, have sent complaints to the District office asking why the faker has not yet been put out.

Scharrenberg, although notified of the proceedings and asked to report, has thus far failed to put in his appearance before the committee.

If the committee reports favorably on the ouster, the membership will vote on his suspension from the union for a 99-year period. This action is expected to occur next Monday.

One of the principal pieces of evidence against the faker is the telegram sent by Scharrenberg to Joseph Ryan asking that he withdraw the charter of Longshoremen's Local 38-29 in favor of the blue book company union.

JACKSON MINER TRIAL SET TO START JUNE 11

TWO OTHERS STILL IN JAIL FACING SAME FAKE CHARGES

JACKSON, Amador County, May 29.—Minger James Workman will go on trial here on June 11 on framed up charges of carrying concealed weapons. Workman was arrested last Feb. 14 for strike activity. Adolpho Canales, who was arrested with him, has already been railroaded to a sentence of one to five years in San Quentin on the same charge.

When Workman saw his fellow worker railroaded without adequate defense being provided by the A. F. of L., he turned his case over to the International Labor Defense. He is now out on bail supplied by that organization.

Two other miners are still held in jail waiting trial and no effort has been made by the A. F. of L. to bail them out. One of them, M. Lopez, has been held for four months and has not yet been arraigned. The other is Phil Casteneda. Both are facing the same charges as Workman.

Anti-Labor Bill Gets No Public Hearing in Com.

SUPPRESSIVE LAW WAS SNEAKED THROUGH COMMITTEE Publicity Avoided SIMILAR BILLS KILLED BY THE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

SACRAMENTO, Calif., May 30.—Blocked by public protest from introducing anti-labor bills to the floor of the Assembly through the Judiciary Committee, the reactionary machine in the Legislature has evaded the blockade by deferring one of the most suppressive bills of all through the Committee on Crime Prevention, Assembly Bill No. 20, which provides for the virtual outlawing of all rank and file working class organizations, has been approved by this Committee and passed on to the Assembly body with a recommendation for its passage.

The treachery of this maneuver is apparent in the fact that every other bill of this nature was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, and it was here that working class and sympathetic groups defeated all their protest. In the open hearings held on anti-labor legislation, this bill was not even included. All news on the status of the bill in committee was carefully eliminated from the press.

Several other almost identical bills were killed when attempt was made to force them through the Committee on Judiciary. It was for this reason that secrecy was maintained on Bill 20. It was deliberately isolated from the rest and sent through different channels in order that the reactionaries could have an ace up their sleeve in event the other bills failed, as they did. It was also for this reason that numerous all-embracing suppressive bills of almost identical content were introduced.

RADIO OPERATORS WIN STRIKE ON THREE LUCKENBACH SHIPS

Longshoremen, Crew of One Ship Join In One Day Strike As Firemen's Leaders Refuse Help

By A. Worker Correspondent SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Members of the American Radio and Telegraphers Association picketed three ships of the Luckenbach Line Wednesday, May 29. They were the Dorothy Luckenbach, Jacob Luckenbach and the F. J. Luckenbach, who came in May 28 and 29. The Line had broken its agreement with the A. R. T. A. two days after it was signed, and the workers struck all three ships.

The International Longshoremen's Association struck the three ships at the same time, and the crew of the Jacob refused to turn to work on the job. The crews of the other two called up their union headquarters, the International Seamen's Union and the Marine Firemen, Oilers and Water-tanks and asked that union agents come aboard and tell them what action to take. The ISU representative came aboard and told the men not to move the ship until the dispute with the A. F. of L. was settled, but the Firemen's representative never showed up.

GREED OF BOND PROFITEER MAY EVICT FARMERS

500 FACE DESTITUTION BECAUSE MILLIONAIRE WANTS BIG PROFITS Bought for 17 Cents R. F. C. WILL RE-FINANCE IF ZUMWALT WILL SELL BONDS

COLUMBIA, Calif., May 30. More than 500 small farmers in Colusa and Glenn Counties face the loss of their land if by Zumwalt, millionaire landholder, continues his refusal to be satisfied with a profit of over 200 per cent on his holdings in delinquent bonds on the irrigation district.

The above are defined as felonies, punishable by one to fourteen years in the State Prison. The following are cited as misdemeanors punishable by fine of \$500 to \$1000 or prison sentence of six months to a year, or both.

UNITED YOUTH PLEDGE FIGHT AGAINST WAR

MOTHER MOONEY CARAVAN JOINS YOUTH MARCH FROM S. F. PARK

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—A gathering of over 500 young workers pledged themselves to carry out the fight against war at the United Youth Day rally held in South Park yesterday.

The fight against war was linked with the fight to free class war prisoners when the youth assembled in the park joined a pilgrimage to Mother Mooney's grave, organized by the Mooney Molders' Defense Committee and the International Labor Defense, in a parade down Howard street to the Ferry Building. The parade was forced to go down Howard street when the police at the last minute announced that the permit for a march on Mission street had been cancelled.

Among the speakers at the South Park meeting were Ben Legere, of the Democratic Council, Archie Brown of the Young Communist League, and Anna Mooney of the Mooney Molders' Defense Committee.

Longview Sell-Out Is Threat To Solidarity Of Lumber Mill Strike

PLAY DIRECTOR KIDNAPED AND BEAT BY NAZIS

DIRECTOR OF "TILL THE DAY I DIE" IS ATTACKED

Threatening Letters HOLLYWOOD PERFORMANCE OF WORKERS' PLAY IRKS FASCISTS

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—Kidnaped, robbed and severely beaten, William Ghere, left-wing drama leader, was recovering today at his home, following a night of horror at the hands of Hitler sympathizers.

Ghere, who directed the play "Till the Day I Die," now showing at the Hollywood Playhouse, was accosted by three men as he was walking home from the theater after the performance last night.

"Is the play over?" one of them asked Ghere. "Yes," replied Ghere. "Did you like it?"

"No," declared all three. One of them added: "We do not approve of the scene where Hitler's picture is torn off the wall."

They took \$3 away from Ghere, explaining that they were taking the money as a refund for the purchase of their seats at the play.

After they drove away, Ghere managed to make his way, slowly and painfully, to a nearby drug store where he called police who took him to the Hollywood Receiving Hospital for treatment. Physicians said they believed he is suffering from internal injuries.

Numerous threatening letters have been received at the theater since the play opened one week ago today, Ghere said. On one occasion a stench bomb was exploded during a performance.

Last night a slight disturbance was created in the theater when Hitler's picture was torn from the wall.

"I really believe they would have killed me if I hadn't said something about kidnaping; that seemed to frighten them," Ghere said.

C.S. Trial In Kelso Closes In Acquittal

KELSO, Wash., May 30.—Max Farrar was acquitted here yesterday of Criminal Syndicalism charges. He was arrested last July in the Workers' Bookstore, during the raids that accompanied the close of the maritime strike.

This was the first Criminal Syndicalism trial in the State of Washington in over twelve years. It is the first time that a member of the Communist Party has ever been prosecuted under the Washington C. S. Law.

The jury which acquitted Farrar included two striking sawmill workers.

No verdict yet reported on Arne Pissila, who is facing trial on the same charges.

ONE-MAN CARS STILL RUNNING

VANDELEUR AVOIDS ANY ACTION TO COMBAT BOSS DRIVE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29.—Oneman cars are now operating on lines 20, 25 and 35 of the Market Street Railway. The Central Labor Council has thus failed to take any practical steps to prevent this drive against the carmen.

Edward Vandeleur, head of the Central Labor Council, is also president of the California Cablemen's union. In spite of the fact that the owners are now pressing a determined campaign to break the union, he has taken no steps to combat them.

It is reliably reported that 30 per cent of the men on this line who participated in last year's General Strike have already been discharged on fake excuses. Non-union men are hired in their places and to get the job they must sign a pledge that they will not join a union.

SYMPATHY WALKOUTS BACK OHIO STEEL MILL STRIKE

Children In Line of Fire Tear-Gassed And Injured In Scab Attack On Militant Picket Line

CANTON, Ohio, May 30.—The strike in the plant of the Berger manufacturing company has brought a reign of police terror against the picket lines, which has so far resulted in injuries to forty strikers, scabs, company guards and bystanders, among the latter fifteen school children. Two workers are in hospitals with gun-shot wounds.

The school children were injured Monday, May 27, first day of the walkout, when a carload of scabs and company guards opened fire on the picket lines with pistols and hurled tear gas bombs. The children were between the strikers and the scabs, and most of them were injured by the tear gas before bystanders could get them out of the way of the thugs.

UNION OFFICIAL RENEWS TRY TO GET ACCEPTANCE OF PHONEY AGREEMENT

Was Once Rejected WORKERS CALL FOR RANK AND FILE NORTHWEST STRIKE COMMITTEE

As we go to press reports come that Abe Muir has managed to get his phoney 5 cent an hour increase agreement accepted by 1,000 members of the Sawmill and Timber Workers' Union in Longview, Washington.

Under the sell-out he has ordered 3,000 men back to work on Monday, June 3d, in Longview mills.

Portland, Ore., May 30.—Abe Muir, West Coast Executive of the Carpenters and Joiners Union and strike-breaker-in-chief for the reactionary union official now trying to sell out the lumber strike is trying to get an opening wedge into the struggle in Longview, Washington.

Muir, together with officials of the Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company drew up a "compromise agreement" which amounted to a 5 cent an hour raise in pay, and gave nothing else to the workers. It presented this to the rank and file for approval, and they voted it down overwhelmingly. He signed and delivered the same terms to strikers in the McCormack mill in St. Helens, Oregon, and ordered them back to work. The St. Helens strikers returned to work and then struck again in protest at the sellout. He again ordered them back to work.

The agreement violated the workers' fifteen-day ultimatum to the operators to accept the local unions as the sole collective bargaining agents.

Before again presenting the agreement for acceptance by the Longview rank and file he has now got it OKed by the Longview Union Council with the hope such endorsement would make it appear more favorable to the strikers.

BRIDGES MAKES GOOD PROGRESS

RANK AND FILE LEADER ANXIOUS TO BE UP AND ON JOB

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Harry Bridges is making good progress in his recovery from an operation for a ruptured stomach ulcer. Although his doctor expresses satisfaction at his condition it is not considered advisable yet to allow visitors.

From his bed in St. Francis hospital the militant longshore leader has expressed distrust at his enforced idleness and wants to get out. "I want to get out of this hospital and back on the water-front," he told a friend yesterday.

WAGE CUTTING DRIVE BEGUN BY EMPLOYERS

COMMUNIST PARTY CALLS FOR FIGHT AGAINST WAGE SLASHES

Stop Evictions WORKERS MUST FIGHT FORECLOSURES AND HIGH PRICES

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Feeling that the NRA has reached the limit of its usefulness in increasing profits, the capitalist class of America has, through the Supreme Court decision, discarded it and entered on an open wage cutting campaign.

Employers, following the Supreme Court decision, ordered wholesale wage reductions. The Piedmont Shirt Company of South Carolina cut wages 25% and increased hours from 36 to 44-a-week. The Crawford Spinning Mill of Gastonia cut pay to \$16 a week for fifty hours.

For the most part cuts announced were not made public, but already the Labor Department in Washington has had to admit receiving reports of extensive wage cutting in seventeen states.

In an interview with the District Committee of the Communist Party the following was pointed out to a reporter from the Western Worker:

1. The NRA in itself did not raise wages.

2. The NRA was merely the form in which the employers were forced to yield to some of the demands of the militant forces of the working class.

3. Whether conditions will be worsened or improved for the working class does not depend on a court decision, but on militant strike and other struggles of labor.

4. The same thing applies to farm foreclosures and evictions. Whether workers lose their homes depends, not on what the Supreme Court decides, but on whether the workers put up a militant fight against evictions and foreclosures.

5. The working class must make a determined fight to bring down prices and the cost of living which was boosted under the NRA.

Prominent Epic Supporter Calls For United Front

Mrs. Kate Crane-Gartz Asks Solidarity Of All Groups To Oppose Danger of Fascism in the U.S.A.

LOS ANGELES, May 31.—Mrs. Kate Crane-Gartz, who has been associated with Union Square in many movements and many causes, has come out to an uninvited front from Mrs. Gartz, one of the principal leaders of the Crane-Gartz Company, former owner of the financial backers in the Fine Company.

During the last day of the convention she took the platform, greeted the delegates and spoke for the united front. She volunteered to repeat what she had said.

She completely neglected to quote her sentiments on the united front, but only reiterated her greetings to the delegates.

What she really meant was that the united front is a class well traveled in the following correspondence between her and her husband:

Life Is Hard.
655 Park Ave., N. Y.
Dear Jim: Just arrived after a fine voyage through the Canal. The Columbia Valley quite perfect and good.

I still think you are the most superstitious member of the Crane family, and you think of four million dollars as a fortune, no matter what they do to America. But much love.

Do Not Tor Workers.
Dear Jim: I am glad to hear that you are able to get healthy. Workers cannot restore their health by going to the hills. They must get their health by working.

I am sorry that you use the word superstition in connection with anything I have ever done or said. I am probably further from you than anyone else you know.

Do you think I am superstitious because I want a new social order. One to which twenty million people are trying to remain on their feet for six straight years without the workers finding a way to build up a stable society with an involuntary unemployment—a society in which there is social insurance for every contingency.

Two Worlds, Two Classes.
The present situation in the U.S. does not seem to make you rebel as I do. I am not moving ahead, according to your friend and mine, Dewey, Steffens, Williams, Strong, and others, and I intend to believe them rather than the lying capitalist papers, which drop up the doing order of which you and I are beneficiaries at the expense of those who built it up, the workers. We live on easy money, and we are not going to feel wicked in accepting everything that is done so little in return for all that they have given.

There is rebellion and unrest all over the earth against the few who have riches and thus live on the backs of the rest. It is wicked to flaunt wealth in "Boom" Predictor Makes Second Try

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Deportation Means Death For Otto Sokhanen

Foreign Born Worker Tells Story of Own Life

The following story by Otto Sokhanen, whom Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins is determined to deport to Finland, shows clearly the true policy of the U. S. Department of Labor. It is a story, simply told, of the life of a Finnish worker, now living in San Francisco by generation authorities of heroic struggle for the revolution. The story is told in the following order: How he came to the U. S. in 1912, how he was deported in 1935, and how he is now in San Francisco, fighting for the revolution.

AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF COMRADE OTTO SOKHANEN

I was born 1891 in the city of Vihti, Finland, of working class parents. At the age of 17 I left home to seek my fortune in the U. S. in a European way. I had no money and no connections.

Today I am 45 years old. I have been in the U. S. for 24 years. I have worked in many different jobs, but I have always been a worker.

Life in Finland.
I was born in a working class family in Vihti, Finland. My father was a cooper, and my mother was a housewife. We lived in a small wooden house.

Migration to the U.S.
I came to the U. S. in 1912, looking for work. I had no money and no connections. I was lucky to find a job in a factory in San Francisco.

Work in the U.S.
I worked in a factory in San Francisco for several years. I was a hard worker and I saved my money. I was able to support my family in Finland.

Political Awakening.
I became interested in politics in the U. S. I read about the Russian Revolution and I was inspired by the workers' struggle.

Joining the Finnish Workers' Party.
I joined the Finnish Workers' Party in San Francisco. I was active in the party and I worked for the revolution.

Deportation.
In 1935, the U. S. government deported me because of my political activities. I was sent to a detention camp in San Francisco.

Life in San Francisco.
I am now in San Francisco, where I continue to work for the revolution. I am active in the Finnish Workers' Party and I am a member of the Communist Party.

Conclusion.
I am proud of my life in the U. S. and I am proud of my work for the revolution. I will continue to fight for the workers' struggle.

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Workers Build Model Soviet State On Ruins Left By Bosses

Ignorance And Misery of Old Days Are Gone

Traders and Profiteers Don't Like New Life In Russia; Genuine Democracy In Dictatorship of Proletariat.

Observers who visit the Soviet Union must not have their minds prejudiced on the process they see today. They must compare what they see with what existed before the workers took power and began the work of social and economic reconstruction. Then they will understand and appreciate the triumphs and really marvelous progress the Russian workers have made.

Itinerary in the Great works presented generally in the Soviet Union more than a year before I left. I saw the workers and farmers, told me that actually few farmers have any more money, and they are slowly being brought into the fold of the new life. Before they could be introduced into the fold of the new life, they were compelled to go to the schools where they were taught such rudiments as arithmetic and political science. A Lenin order must be said that these illiterate farmer boys have received in the hands of the new machinery of handling the most modern and intricate machinery of the world.

A genuine democracy. The genuine democracy is possible and practicable in the Soviet Union today for the reason that the workers and farmers are in the hands of the working class. Absentee landlordism has been abolished. There are no more lords or masters to land or any kind of property. The workers—the people who produce the goods—own and operate all the means of life, and in common enjoy the proceeds of their collective labor. In the days of private ownership and exploitation, the individual can be, and has been, a capitalist, a speculator, a profiteer, or a distributor, but not a producer. There is no opportunity for anyone in the Soviet Union to make profit out of anything. The person who attempts it will be quickly arrested and punished.

No Trading For Profit. Frequently individuals from the United States who should know better, talk with them to the Soviet Union merchants which, if they could sell to the Russian workers, would net them a small fortune in Russian rubles. One such individual, who had been in the country for some time, was taken with me from New York to Leningrad. Being a dilettante, and knowing the shortage of food that existed in the Soviet Union, he took with him a trunk filled with some and other delicacies. How he expected to get the trunk passed through the Soviet Union without being the Soviet officials. He was not. He was arrested and his trunk was confiscated. He was then taken to the characteristic American process of bribing public officials, he begged for his trunk was seized, and almost being expelled from the country.

The waterfront has now been able to study examples of two types of leadership, the alleged "radicals" who led last year's struggle, and the labor factors, notably Paul Scharenberg, who called and conducted the strike.

The longshore strike was organized, called and conducted by the rank and file after proper preparations had been made.

The tanker strike was called without any preparation and was deliberately sabotaged by Scharenberg and others after they got it started.

The first strike, under militant, "radical" leadership won definite gains. The second, under Scharenberg's leadership, lost.

The first strike, through militant picketing, tied up the commerce of the employers. The second strike, through Scharenberg's tactic of discouraging picket lines, hardly inconvenienced the employers. All tankers are now sailing with full crews.

It is apparent to the militant workers now that "radical" leadership means lowest rank and file leadership.

The International Seamen's Union is now conducting a trial for the purpose of "ousting" Paul Scharenberg. To date the capitalist press has not carried a line of news on this significant development. Yet an anti-labor communication from an employer to a labor factor is considered worthy of mention.

BULLET PROOF CONFIDENCE

In two radio addresses last month, President Roosevelt assured a doubting public that his administration had achieved, if not a difficult point to put over on such thin evidence, he urged confidence in the future and praised the success of his administration's policies.

Motivated, perhaps, by this same confidence, the president's little acquired a bullet-proof glass and steel armor lining.

END OF THE NRA

Guard of the Socialist Party, together with the A. F. of L. chiefs, were whooping it up for the NRA, at the time when even militant Socialist leaders like Herman Thomas were seeing the NRA "a step toward Socialism." It was the Communist Party that ripped the mask off the whole New Deal program and called on the workers to fight against anti-labor laws.

Today the analysis of the Communist Party, the whole line of its activity stands fully revealed.

PREPARE FOR STRUGGLE

And just as the Communist Party throughout the past two years called on the workers to fight against the NRA, so today it once again summons the call to the working masses of the country to prepare for immediate determined resistance against the effects of the dismantling of the NRA—against wage cuts, lengthening of hours, attempts to smash union organizations, etc.

Action—initiated action on the widest basis—not talk, is needed. In his speech at Madison Square Garden, New York, last Thursday, William Greer, president of the A. F. of L., talked about a general strike for the NRA. Coming from the man who last year during the San Francisco general strike, came out flatly against any general or sympathetic strike, this can only be interpreted as a playing with the idea of strike action for the purpose of mobilizing the workers in support of the policies of the capitalists.

Not a strike for the NRA, but militant action against every attempt to use the Supreme Court decision in order to lower living standards. Yes, also the instrument of a political mass strike of labor.

Not class collaboration policies that cause labor to put its head into the mouth of the capitalist lion, but class struggle AGAINST the capitalists, AGAINST their wage-cutting, union-smashing starvation program.

BUILD MASS LABOR PARTY

Not the splitting of labor's ranks through the espousal of the best fighters as Mike Tigue has done in the Unorganized Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, but unity of all the forces of labor around a militant program is the historic need.

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FUMIGATING THE WATERFRONT

Ninety per cent of the baggage, brain trust and elements of the Scharrenberg Union will be eliminated when they get rid of the infamously wicked and Chairman S. A. Silver. The air will be still clearer when Mr. Govern and Larsen get the boot. Besides, Scharrenberg is apt to get lonely in the garbage can without his cronies.

They might like to have Vandenberg with them also. Then when they get to reminiscing on how they sold out the General Strike and how they maneuvered the Central Labor Council to play into the hands of the employers, he'll come in handy.

That's a good tip for the carmen. One of the first steps toward preventing one-man cars is to get rid of the false union leaders who make such disgraceful blunders.

But there's something to watch out for here. What is the use of dumping one faker if you put another one in office to take his place?

Elect a man out of your ranks. Not a fancy wordy, but a sailor, select him for his mistakes and his past record of struggle. Pick the sort of rank and file leader that will start the employers and the capitalist press raving and ranting about "Reds" and "Bolsheviks". Then you'll know you've got an honest official who won't sell you out to them.

THE AWFUL HOWLING OF MR. HEARST

You know what a cheap nasty little liar he is. Well, give a rat like that a megaphone of the size of a mountain and let him howl his lies so that they can be heard around the world, and still he remains nothing but a cheap, dirty little liar. Hege can't overcome the facts.

Too many people read the capitalist press (particularly the Hearst sheets) and get a feeling of hopelessness. They think that if the public is swallowing a lot of vicious nonsense like they see printed, then what chance of doing anything? The editors of the Hearst papers are not expressions of public opinion. They are merely the pus drained off the fetid brain of a badly frightened parasite. This treacherous ideology is as disgusting to the rest of the public as it is to you.

And what is the real reason for recognizing them? These are the traitors through whom they can negotiate settlements and beat down all struggles.

But what was the result of this campaign? Increased rank and file control and the kicking out of an arch reactionary. And the start of a campaign to systematically rid the unions of all the other mediocrities as enthusiastically endorsed by the employers and their kept press.

NO DISCIPLINE SPELLS DEFEAT

There is a race of learned philosophers who like to lounge back and declare that Communism is the only way to get the ideas right, but the Communist Party is too dogmatic.

They mean by this that they cannot submit themselves to the discipline of the Party, or else the Party refuses to compromise with them on some pet religious, racial or temperamental prejudice.

Just how far a loosely organized, undisciplined group, embracing vast and constantly shifting differences of opinion can get in the fight against capitalism, is well illustrated in the experience of the Epic block of legislators in Sacramento.

They had ample strength to block the reactionary budget bill which threw the burden of cost on the shoulders of labor and spared the purses of the rich. But what happened? Free to bend and sway in the breezes of their own whims and prejudices, undisciplined by a clear party line, bound by no instructions from a closely organized body, they were unable to get together.

Members of the Communist Party must adhere to the principle of democratic centralism—a principle that they understand as more important to the working class cause than any private difference of opinion of the moment. This means that in deciding an action, each member of a group has ample time to expound his views. But when a vote is taken, all members of the group abide by that decision and carry it out conscientiously.

Capitalism is no push over. It is powerful, desperate and unscrupulous. At the present time it is defending itself like a wounded bear. An undisciplined group with no uniform adherence to basic principles is helpless to tackle such a foe.

The class struggle is not a child's play. Thousands have sacrificed their lives to it and thousands more have come to jail unflinchingly. This struggle involves a serious responsibility. No one proposes that discipline is a pleasure. But members of the Communist Party submit themselves to it because they understand that without it no revolutionary struggle has the slightest chance of success.

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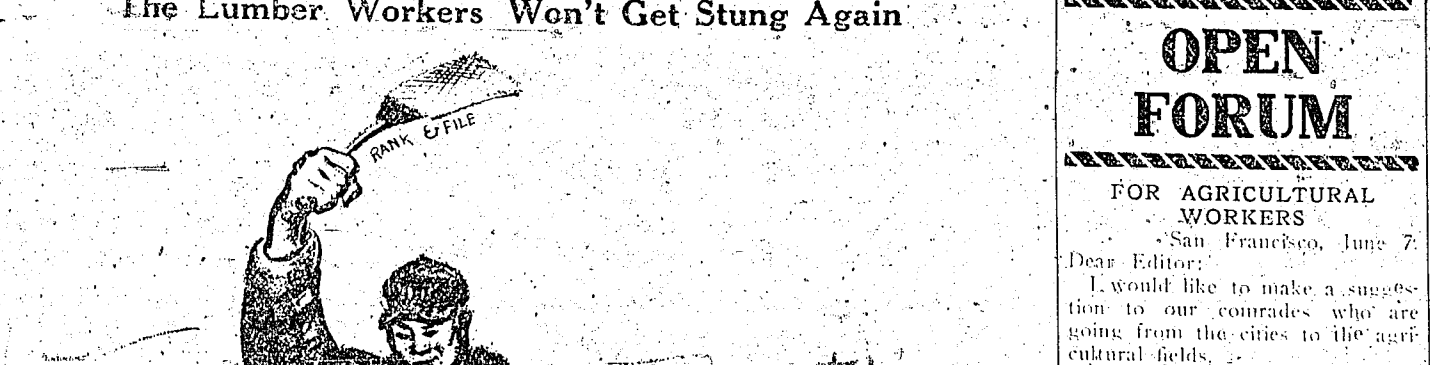

International Labor Defense Takes Case for Worker Slugged and Robbed by Mob and Jailed for Vagrancy by Police

RICHMOND, Cal., June 13.—Andro Bartulovich, who was slugged by vigilantes and jailed by the police during the raid of last year in entering civil suits for false imprisonment and for damages he suffered in the beating.

The Mayor, the City Council, Police Chief L. E. Jones, Officer Floyd, as well as the desk sergeant and the jailer are defendants in the suit.

Bartulovich waited many months for his case to come to trial, finally becoming tired at the court's delays he put his case in the hands of the International Labor Defense, which has assigned its attorney George Anderson of San Francisco.

The present suit is similar to the existing one, in that Bartulovich received a judgment of \$300 from the city of Richmond for a vigilante raid on his home, a place of business, during July, 1934.

On the trial on Bartulovich's home was made at midnight, July 2, 1934. A mob of so-called "National Guards" burst into the home and demanded that he open the door. They went through his personal effects, breaking open two trunks and taking out a quantity of books belonging to the South Sea Lodge (which was later returned), a Savings Bank letter, a check for \$100, and other valuables, none of which were returned.

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WILL JAPAN MAKE WAR ON CHINA?

If you mean, will an armed struggle occur between the forces of Kuomintang (Nationalist) China and Japanese Imperialism, the answer is definitely no. A few Japanese militarists may be excited and a few hundred men subjected by both sides in order to save face. But there will be no real war.

If you mean, will an armed struggle occur between the Chinese people and the forces of Japanese Imperialism, the answer is emphatically yes.

The Kuomintang forces of Chiang Kai Shek are already engaged in a major war against the Chinese Soviets. The result of the Chinese people against the Kuomintang government (agent of foreign imperialism) and against the Japanese invasion are one and the same thing. Thus the Chinese Nationalists have more in common with the Japanese than they have with the Chinese masses.

It is true that the Kuomintang and the Japanese represent rival capitalist interests. But for one to oppose the other at this time would mean that both of them would go down in defeat. The Japanese have no desire to see Chiang Kai Shek remove his army from the frontier of Soviet China in order to combat the Japanese in the North. And Chiang Kai Shek has no intention of doing so.

Financed by American, British and other foreign capitalists, Chiang Kai Shek has inflicted the largest and best equipped army ever marshaled in China against the Red Army of workers and peasants. Despite this, he has been unable to crush the revolutionary forces and it is all thanks to this giant military machine that can prevent the Soviet districts (one-fifth of China comprising approximately 100 million persons) from expanding to cover the whole of China.

Obviously, to remove troops from this front would mean the collapse of the Red Army. As it is, the recent advances of the Red Army have made it all too evident that the National Government is tottering and that Chiang Kai Shek will be unable to command the situation much longer.

It is the avowed purpose of both the Kuomintang and the Japanese invaders to prevent China from going Communist. Japanese militarists have the additional concern of establishing a powerful Communist movement within their own borders. Japanese capitalism depends so largely upon exploitation of China, that a Soviet China would immediately be followed by a Soviet Japan.

Japan, therefore, aims not only at crushing the Communist movement of China, but also at establishing a strong base in North China from which to attack the U. S. S. R.

It will be observed that the entire Japanese program of conquest is belligerent and foolhardy. None the less, Japan is moving in desperation.

Failure of the Kuomintang to offer real resistance to the increased expansion of the Japanese in North China will result in further weakening of Chiang Kai Shek's influence. The real resistance against the invasion will come from the Chinese masses and will be expressed as much against the Kuomintang as against the Japanese.

A LITTLE COMMUNISM GOES A LONG WAY

Andrew Furuseth, president of the International Seamen's Union ratifies Communism as very convincing fellows. He attributes the success of Scharenberg from the Sailors' Union by an almost unanimous vote to the aid of the Communists.

It speaks badly for the logic of the Furuseth-Scharenberg crowd that with full command of the union meetings and the capitalist press, they are still unable to compete with a "handful" of Communist equipped only with a mimeograph and the Western Worker.

The same thing is true of the nation's educational system. With control of virtually all propaganda mediums and with every classroom diligently expounding their arguments, the authorities are still unable to stem the tide of Communist ideas in the schools and universities.

There is evidently something wrong with their bill of goods. The Communist system has better success with inadequate equipment and the stiffest opposition than the employers have with the most elaborate paraphernalia and nothing standing in their way.

There is a reason for this. The employers are faced with a nearly more difficult task. They have to convince the public of things which are obviously not true.

It was a very simple matter to point out that Scharenberg was a rat. The fact was all too true. But it was quite another matter to try to convince the sailors that he was an honest leader. In fact it was impossible. And that is the task the employers and their agents were faced with.

I saw the legionary march, but here we were not marching as a threat aimed at the embodiment of war, we were marching as the workers, themselves, armed and ready to defend and preserve their party and integrity.

The day was clear with not a cloud in sight. Directly, the procession of airplanes was the most magnificent display of flying machines I had ever seen.

After two hours of this military display, with batteries and regiments crossing the Square on the south side, a clear mist was seen over the city.

I, an inmate of the State Prison at San Quentin, California, do hereby authorize the Warden of said Prison, to use any money earned as interest on any money which I have deposited with him, also to deduct a percentage of any part of such money, \$5.11 may expend each month provided such deductions do not exceed 5% of such monthly expenditures, and to use same, at his discretion, for the education and entertainment of all inmates, and in the purchase of books and magazines for the prison library.

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WHO FEARS THE WESTERN WORKER?

There are two men who fear the WESTERN WORKER—and they are the Siamese Twins of American capitalism. One is the employer and the other is the traitorous union official of the Scharrenberg type. Smashing the offices of the Western Worker and smashing the General Strike were all-one-process carried out by the same employers' interests. Jameson, an official of the San Francisco local of the Marine Firemen's Union (branch of the I.S.U.), had the bare-faced gall to stand up before the last membership meeting and boast that he was one of the "vigilantes" who smashed the offices of the Western Worker. Such a character is a smear on the face of organized labor and a disgrace to the union local he represents. In this connection, it is well to recall that last year, during the funeral parade of Sperry and Coudeorakis, a Western Worker salesman was attacked by several hoodlums and had his papers taken from him and destroyed. This at a time when all San Francisco labor was honoring Nicolas Coudeorakis, a Communist Party member who gave his life in the interests of the working class. It is not difficult to figure out who put these hoodlums up to the job. The question is, will such an incident be repeated this year on July Fifth? It might have happened that another Communist Party member had been shot on that "Bloody Thursday" instead of Nick. In that case, Nick would be alive today and it is not improbable he might be selling Western Workers along the line of march.

MURDER GETS ITS WIRES CROSSED

The whole consternation of employers and union fakery over the police slaying of Fred Friedl is expressed in the blubbery, confused accounts of the killing printed in the San Francisco Chronicle and Examiner. The explanation seems to be that Friedl mistook the police for Reds and the police mistook Friedl for a Red and both sides opened fire. Both papers avoided mentioning that Friedl had just been expelled from the Marine Firemen's local of which he was business agent. They refer to "attempts by radicals to oust him," but are silent about the expulsion. Notorious as an employer's agent and betrayer of labor, Friedl had recently resorted to open gangsterism in an effort to beat down the militant opposition which was exposing his treachery. In all these previous exploits, he enjoyed the passive co-operation of the police who refused to take any hand in defending the militants. Following his expulsion, Friedl marshalled his "Beef Squad" and set out on a rampage of reprisals against rank and file leaders. When hailed by the police, he mistook them for "his enemies" and opened fire. Yet the capitalist papers, in their accounts, laud him as one of labor's leaders, just as they praise the cheat Scharrenberg to the skies and speak of his expulsion as the work of "a few radicals." At the same time, they cautiously avoid mentioning that the action was taken by an almost unanimous vote. The corruption of the capitalist press accounts reach their highest point when they suggest that "radicals" may have tricked the police into killing Friedl by giving them a false tip that he was a Red. They propose to alibi the police by explaining that they ransacked Friedl's room, found a small sized arsenal and a lot of radical literature, whereupon they lay in wait for him and shot him dead. The implication here is that Reds are criminals, therefore the police were taking correct action. Yet no one has ever produced any evidence to the effect that Reds have committed crimes, there is nothing illegal about the Communist Party, and Red literature is sold openly in bookstores. Friedl's arsenal is vividly explained by saying that he was a "hunter," and again, that he had to defend himself from the Reds.

WHO IS GOING TO BE TAXED?

No greater idiocy ever concerned man than the present capitalist press hysteria over the fact that Roosevelt is toying with the idea of taxing the rich. The nation is now burdened with the most extensive and expensive program of war preparations we have ever seen outside an actual period of war. Who is going to pay for it? The country has the largest number of needy unemployed any nation has ever seen. Who is going to feed them? The rich seem to think the working class should pay for it. When you tax the rich, the rich pass the burden on to the workers by raising prices and cutting wages. Yet they have already hammered wages down pretty nearly to bed-rock. The rich possess all the land, all the houses, all the factories, all the food, all the money—they own the whole damned works. They shove just enough money out their pay windows every month to keep the workers from starving to death, and take it all back again through their cash registers the next morning. A more foolish situation could not be imagined. They not only expect to own the whole works and have the working population do all the work for mere board and room, but they also expect the working class to buy them an army and navy and pay the running expenses. Meanwhile, they do nothing but sit around on their fancy dividends eating a lot of good chuck and saying that Communism is un-American.

Day In and Night Out

By an Oakland Cannery Girl Dawn was breaking when we heard the head foreman rasp: "All right, girls, all get for breakfast!" We muttered under our breaths. Three hours to go before home. We turned the faucets, let the water run into our bins, plugged the water drain so that the "grass" (Asparagus) left in our bins wouldn't spoil while we had our coffee and stale doughnuts sold in the company cafeteria. Weary and bleary-eyed we rushed to our simulant. The girls were pretty much shot. After nine hours of work (we start at 7 in the evening) three hours to go is somewhat of a consolation, considering that we worked 14 hours the night before and some of us made about three bucks before breakfast. The conversation at the "lunch period" (12 midnight) was a bit different from the breakfast jabber. The girls are not quite so tired and their big desire was to step on the "grass" more furiously so as to bring up their meager wages. We talked about the movie we wanted to see or the dance we would like to attend, "but this damned nit work—see, we never have any time!" And by the time our night-off comes around we're too tired to do anything but sleep.

At breakfast time we were completely off our feet. We always find something to gripe about. Of course, we are right. Mary got cheated out of a tray, and the Lord knows, when it takes half an hour to can 24 cans of asparagus, 12 cents means money. Jeanette said she got checked out 50 minutes because she went out to rub her feet. She's a rather large girl, you know, and when her feet begin to ache, they ache. One of the girls was telling us about the guy who just cut two fingers (almost off) on the sorting side, he bled like a pig and she doubted whether he would get his compensation. Just then we were told to go back inside and begin again. The last three hours were lousy. The "grass" was dirty, we had more "soup" (throw-outs) than good stuff. Seemed all we did was slave for the company on our time and waste our energy for a measly 50 cents more.

The devil once in a while. It's finally time to go home. The cannery is a musty old building and it reeks. We are glad to get out of it for awhile. We get a few hours sleep, clean the house, say hello to our kids and husbands and dash back again tonight. We had one dickens of a nit the other nit. The company contracted several hundred boxes of asparagus from another cannery and in addition to our usual load we had enough "grass" to can for a week. But we didn't have a week to can it in. We had only one night, so you can imagine how we slaved. The night was nothing short of hell and we felt we would land there too, by the time we were finished. The girls were as sore as bolts. "What do they think we are, animals?" The "grass" was filthy, the grading was harder and that, of course slowed up our work to a great extent. All in all we couldn't make enough to pay for our salt.

Hearst's Sky Pilot Red-Baiter Flops Minister Rants Against Communism for Audience of Seven in Auditorium With 2000 Capacity. SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—The Reverend Rex Mitchel, Baptist Bible Thumper of Paso Robles, self-styled 100 per cent patriot, and much ballyhooped protégé of William Randolph Hearst, took the Scottish Rite Auditorium, which seats 2000 people, for a night's oratorical crusade against Communism on Sunday, June 15. He did his hysterical stuff before an audience of seven,—three of whom were Communists. When he stepped on the platform at 8:10 p. m. briefcase in hand, he stared in amazement at the few persons present, three women and two men. He retreated to an anteroom till 8:30, evidently expecting an audience of late comers. He was observed jitters about a peep-hole, evidently dazed by the failure of the people to come swarming at the call of the S. F. "Examiner" to come and hear the Reds denounced. "Finally" he came from retirement and with the aid of the janitor, moved his desk to the floor of the auditorium. "To be in closer communion with his audience." At this point two elderly ladies entered and were invited. "Come up to the front, Christian people!" The prayer with which he opened was a curiosity: "Oh, God, we thank thee for this opportunity to voice in Christian spirit our opposition to Communism, Socialism, the I. W. W.,—against pacifism, against any and all attempts at the equalization of private property; and we further, oh Lord, ask strength in combatting the evils of the philosophy of Marx and Engels. Grant, oh Lord, a blessing on the forthcoming Baptist convention to be held in Colorado Springs; rout the modernists; the Lord, and may the fundamentalists gain control! Amen!" He spoke for one hour and ten minutes, laying upon Communism the blame for the stock market crash, closing of the banks, ouster of Paul Scharrenberg by the Seamen, the dust storm in the Middle West, and the disension within the Baptist Church. "Communists are the agents of the Devil, roaming everywhere, seeking whom they may crucify," cried the Reverend Mitchel. "The collection was fourteen cents."

Tulare Workers' Picnic Features Question of Union. TULARE, Calif., June 24.—Agricultural workers, both in the fields and in the canneries, unemployed and S.E.R.A. workers, will gather at Mooney's Grove, not far from here, on Sunday, June 30, for a labor picnic. The picnic is a step forward toward organizing a mass A. F. of L. agricultural union in this area. An official permit has been granted the Tulare Organizational Committee which has charge of the affair. E. C. Dowd, American Federation of Labor Organizer from the Fresno Central Labor Council and other prominent A. F. of L. speakers will address the gathering. All workers are invited.

SINCLAIR'S TWO CENTS WORTH. Upton Sinclair has gotten on the merry-go-round with the rest of capitalism's humbugs and has taken up the cry of "purge the Reds." He has announced that unless the EPIC movement will immediately "purge the Reds" out of its ranks, he will forsake it. This is identically the same cry as that of the Waterfront Employers Association, the Industrial Association, the Chambers of Commerce, Paul Scharrenberg, Edward Vandeleur, William Green, the top jingots of the American Legion, the Rotary Club, the Elks Club and every other mouthpiece of capitalism. As a matter of fact, Sinclair has already forsaken those features of the EPIC platform which won him such an enormous following at the last election. And his appeal at the Epic convention was that the movement must make still further compromises. His theory seems to be that the only way to overcome opposition is to change your principles to accord with those of your opponent. This new slogan of his will win him at least one adherent, William Randolph Hearst, even though he lose the whole rank and file of the EPICS.

OPEN FORUM AN OPEN LETTER TO PAUL MUNI (Star of the film, "Black Fury") June 17, 1935. Sir: Being a former coal miner and having mined in the part of Pennsylvania where your picture was supposed to have been taken, I went to see your picture, "Black Fury." In the first place your part was awful. Secondly, one is compelled to go through an examination and must read and write the English language. All explosives are under strong lock and key and guarded. The five ton car you pushed in the mine is never placed at the entrance, the main line being always kept clear. Your scene was to have taken place in a shaft mine, which is always under ground. The shaft lowest shaft in the coal region is 225 feet, yet you pushed a 5-ton car through a top hole from a drift mine—two different mines altogether. Your union hall scene was terrible. A miners' union always stations two men at the door to take the pass-word, which is one of their strictest laws. No one is allowed to enter uninvited. One thing the picture did was tell the truth, not of the hired thugs, but of the real tactics of the sheriffs and state troopers. You show the workers fighting among themselves—when even you know how they stick together while leaders from the class war represent sell them out. Workers everywhere are waking up and seeking some of the comforts of life and it will take more than a camera to quench their thirst. M. Smith.
