LONGSHOREMEN THREATENED WITH LOCKOUT

Employers Say Men Must Work Unfair Cargo

LONGSHOREMEN ORDERED
TO SCAB OR FACE
LOCK-OUT

Ultimatum Served
SEEN AS MANEUVER TO
SMASH MILITANT
LEADERSHIP

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—San Francisco Longshoremen today answered the union smashing attempts of the shipowners by consistently refusing to penetrate a mass picket line thrown around the scab-loaded Point Clear at Pier 54.
As fast as longshore gangs are dispatched to the Point Clear they refuse to go through the line. They return to the dispatching hall and are sent to work at other docks.
Shipowners, up until a late hour today, however, were refusing to hire at any dock longshore gangs that previously had declined to work the scab ship, Point Clear.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—Fast on the heels of a threat by Ryan and Lewis, reactionary Longshore officials, to revoke the charter of the San Francisco local of the I.L.A. because of its rank and file leadership, came late yesterday an ultimatum from the shipowners to the S. F. Longshoremen.

The S. F. longshoremen have been ordered to unload the Point Clear or face a lock-out. The ultimatum, voiced by Plant of the Waterfront Employers, called upon Lewis to remove the militant leaders of the longshoremen and according to the S. F. Chronicle of June 28, the move is a "tactical maneuver" cooperated in by conservative labor leaders to drive radicals out of responsible positions in labor ranks.

*** Scab Cargo.**
The ultimatum further says the employers have "no quarrel with organized labor," but throughout there is no mention of the fact that the Point Clear was loaded in Vancouver by scabs (the crew was shanghaied to Vancouver in order to get scab cargo).
Meanwhile it is reported that Lewis has issued a coast-wide ballot calling for a vote as to "whether the letter and spirit of the agreements are to be kept." It is further authoritatively reported that Lewis will revoke the charter of any local which turns down the ballot.

Many waterfront workers have taken this to mean that Lewis is calling upon longshoremen to scab on their striking brothers in Vancouver "or else!"

POLICE DRIVE ON SAN PEDRO RANK AND FILE

SAN PEDRO SHIPOWNERS
AND POLICE PLAN TO
ATTACK UNIONS

Red Scare Is Raised
DEATH OF RILEY FOLLOWS
CAMPAIGN OF TERROR
BY GANGSTERS

SAN PEDRO, June 27.—The death of John Riley, member of the late Friedl's "beer squad" which for months has roamed the streets of San Pedro terrorizing militant members of the Firemen's Union, may be the signal for an attack by shipowners and police upon all unions in view of making Pedro an open shop town.

Riley died early this week of injuries received when he and nine other members of the Friedl gang raided a home where about forty members of the Firemen's Union were meeting. Riley and his thugs were repulsed. Hendricks, Bob North and Bruley were with Riley at the time. All are members of the reactionary clique.

*** Was Provocateur.**
A capitalist newspaper report says a sub-machine gun was found in Friedl's home during the search following his death at the hands of San Pedro police. Other reports say the rifle found in Friedl's place was the gun fired at tankers here during the recent strike. This would indicate that Friedl had been active as a provocateur.
There are reports that the police are planning to clamp down via martial law, prohibiting meetings and the functioning of unions. San Pedro and Los Angeles papers are whipping up the red scare and report the police are searching the city for 50 known Communists.

Friedl was aligned with the Peterson-Norman-Lindgren gang which attempted to steal power away from the rank and file at the formation of the Maritime Federation.

SAILORS VOTE CONFIDENCE IN BRIDGES; CALL JOINT ISU MEET

Three-Hour Session Passes Progressive
Measures; Demand Scharrenberg Be
Denied Appeal on Expulsion

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—The interrupted meeting of the Sailor's Union of July 24 reconvened the following morning at 10 o'clock and in a three-hour session transacted a considerable amount of business, most of it of a progressive nature.

Following the lead of the San Pedro Branch of the Sailor's Union, the Firemen's Union in San Francisco and the local District Council of the Maritime Federation, the membership passed a resolution condemning Ryan and Lewis for their threat to revoke the charter of the San Francisco local of the International Longshoremen.

A vote of confidence was given Harry Bridges and the rest of the rank and file I.L.A. leadership. To prevent further a come-back of Paul Scharrenberg, recently expelled from the Sailor's Union, instructions were sent to Andrew Furuseth, President of the International Seamen's Union, to refuse aid to Scharrenberg in his efforts to avoid expulsion.

B. C. DOCKMEN PREPARED FOR BITTER FIGHT

VANCOUVER BIG BUSINESS
LAUNCHES VIGILANTE
TERROR CAMPAIN

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 27.—Waterfront workers here are preparing for one of the bitterest struggles in the history of Canadian labor in an attempt to win better working conditions and a decent standard of living.

Tuesday, June 18, when the Shipping Federation and Mayor McGeer launched their initial attack on picket lines already has become known as "Bloody Tuesday."

The vicious attack has served only to tighten the ranks of the striking dock workers and has brought wide-spread support from the entire labor movement here.
In spite of unbridled police terror, picket lines still patrol all docks and little scab labor is reported.

Prominent in the ranks of the shipper-owned vigilante gangs are the three known as the "Citizens' League of British Columbia" who represent a united front of big business.

The strike began June 14 when shippers broke a previous agreement with the waterfront union. On Tuesday, June 18, police attacked pickets and a three-hour pitched battle ensued. Mounted and foot police raced back and forth, clubbing men and women and attacking with clubs, tear gas and sawed-off shotguns.
More than 75 workers were injured, many seriously, and at least two with gunshot wounds.

SOMETHING MUST BE DONE ABOUT HEARST

Much has been said revealing the viciousness of William Randolph Hearst. Endless volumes could be written on his corruption. But the problem is no longer to convince the public of his unscrupulousness—a fact so manifestly plain that it needs no further elucidation—but to convince them that something must be done about it.

The man is a real power. There is no sense in denying that. He wields the power of the press and the power of money. And the danger is not that he himself is a solitary menace, unique and complete. The truth is that he is in league with the rest of the major cap lists of the country who control the government as readily as their own households. Indeed, they own the whole country as their personal property and the rest of the population has the status of domestic servants. Hearst's newspapers are not the word of a single oppressor. They are the voice of Wall Street itself, of which Hearst is an integral part.

To take the attitude of, "Let the man rave. I don't believe him and nobody else believes him. And we're not going to be fooled by his tricks," is to play right into his hand.

When you're worried about how to pay the rent, think of HEARST. When your wages are cut, or you lose your job, think of HEARST. When you're broke, when you're hungry, when you need medical attention and can't afford it, think of HEARST. When you see little kids going to school in ragged clothes, think of HEARST. When you think of the depression, think of HEARST.

For these are the real, concrete results of that man's power and of the ruling class greed he represents. A nation that tolerates the activities of such a man is a nation degenerated to a low point of disgrace. There is not a working man or woman in America who does not feel the results of the Hearst press in the immediate difficulties of their lives.

It is far beyond the point where you can verbally condemn the Hearst papers and let it go at that. Their continued publication is costing you too much in personal suffering. You've got to do something about it.

You've got to fight the Hearst press, not as an enemy com-

COUNCIL OF FED. SUPPORTS COAST LUMBER STRIKE

AMMUNITION SHIPMENT TO
VANCOUVER BY QUINN
IS PROTESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Resolutions relating to the two major struggles now being waged on the Pacific Coast—the great lumber strike and the strike of the Vancouver waterfront workers—were passed at the regular session of the newly-formed local District Council of the Maritime Federation, meeting here June 24.

The Council voted to send a resolution to Mayor Rossi of San Francisco protesting the vicious action of Police Chief Quinn in sending ammunition to the police of Vancouver to be used in shooting down the striking waterfront workers there. Copies of the protest will be sent to Quinn and to the secretary of the Longshore and Water Transport Workers of Canada.

*** Hit Fakers.**
To counteract the successful maneuvers of the Eureka Longshore officials and Scabby Peterson in forcing the Eureka workers to handle scab lumber, the council took steps to remind the Eureka officials of the Federation resolution and that of the I.L.A. District Convention to support the lumber strikers. The communication also will include the request that the Eureka longshoremen refuse to load scab cargo.

It is generally understood that any lumber which may be held in San Francisco will be declared "hot."

*** Office's Nominated.**
In addition, the Council voted to continue indefinitely the Standard Oil boycott and to change the name of the Federation paper from "Voice of the Federation" to "The Maritime Federationist."
The following were nominated for permanent officers: Harry Bridges, (I.L.A.) president; Ralstead, (MMP), and O'Grady, (MMP), vice-presidents; Rathborne, (ARTA), Schmidt, (I.L.A.), Warfaron, (Ship-Caulkers), Hanen, (M.F.O.W.), secretary-treasurer.
A motion by a Marine Firemen's delegate to adjourn in honor of Friedl, came rather late. It was received with little enthusiasm, in view of Friedl's reactionary record.

Machinists Boo Scharrenberg's Anti-Red Note

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Wednesday night was anti-Scharrenberg night at the regular meeting here of Machinists' Local 68. Scharrenberg's vicious anti-Communist letter was read and completely smothered amid a storm of cat-calls and boos.
The membership, by a two-to-one vote elected Charlie Oczo as delegate to the Central Labor Council. Oczo was opposed by W. Henneberry, a friend of the reactionaries. The vote was 66 to 20 in favor of Oczo.

OTHER UNIONS VOTE SUPPORT ON JULY 5TH

DOCK PICKETING, PARADE
ARE SCHEDULED ON
DAY'S PROGRAM

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—The Machinists, Local 68, and the Ornamental Iron Workers Union today answered the employers' attacks on organized labor by pledging participation in the July 5th march and demonstration.

The arrangements and preparations for July 5 are well under way. A leaflet, calling for complete stoppage of work by members of maritime unions on the Pacific Coast and pointing out that the demonstration is to show the opposition of organized labor to the employers' violence in attempting to break strikes, has been issued by the Joint Maritime Arrangements Committee.

The program for July 5 includes: picketing of docks from 8 to 9:30 a. m.; a parade at 10 a. m. up Market street from the Embarcadero to Marshall Green. The various organizations participating will march under their own banners. Two bands will lead the parade.

Included in the Longshoremen's section of the parade will be the ladies' auxiliary and a children's section. Two delegations will leave Marshall Green, one to the grave of Howard Sperry, the other to the grave of Nick Bondrose.

The commemoration will continue at Draganland Auditorium at 8 p. m. There movies of the P-34 strike will be shown and speakers from the Maritime unions and other organizations will be heard. Among the speakers will be Harry Bridges, Henry Schmidt and Ben Legere.

AUGUST FIRST SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—NOTICE TO ALL SEC- TIONS.

The official date of the anti-war demonstrations to be held in conjunction with the 21st anniversary of the imperialist world slaughter is August 1.

Strikers Rally Against Terror In Three States

GUARDSMEN STOP OPEN
AIR MEETING IN
TACOMA

Oregon Troops Ready
STATE TROOPS, FEDERAL
MEDIATORS CALLED TO
BREAK LUMBER STRIKE

TACOMA, Wash., June 27.—Without declaring martial law the National Guard is refusing civil rights to all workers in Tacoma. They have prevented strikers from selling tags on the streets to raise relief funds.

Guardsmen broke up a meet held on open air demonstration there Wednesday, the 26th which had been called by the Unemployed Council. Hundreds of workers gathered at the meet, which had been endorsed by the rank and file of the Sawmill and Timber Workers, the Shingle Weavers, Broomworkers, Brewery Workers, Lathers, Plp and Sulphite Workers, the Longshoremen, American League Against War and Fascism, International Labor Defense and the Communist Party.

Several truckloads of troops drove up, and when the spokesman got up to speak the troops unloaded, and forcibly dispersed the crowd, threatening violence if their demands were not complied with. The workers' retired in good order to an indoor meet where speakers from the various organizations criticized Governor Maginn for calling the National Guard.

A delegation visited the city, county and state officials, and the chamber of commerce demanding removal of the troops and disbanding of the fascist "Committee of 200."

A delegation of 25 workers demanded relief officials that relief be given to strikers, and also protested Roosevelt's war program.

*** Longshoremen Help.**
With the longshoremen here refusing to work while the bosses National Guard carries on a reign of terror to break the strike of the lumber workers, the rank and file workers of Tacoma are considering a general strike it

LOS ANGELES RELIEF MOGULS OPEN WAR ON JOBLESS UNION

Glendale Police Called to Attack Large
Grievance Committee Seeking Better
Conditions for SERA Workers

LOS ANGELES, June 27.—In an effort to smother the Public Works and Unemployed League which has been active in winning more food and better conditions for workers on relief, the Los Angeles Citizen's Relief Committee has ordered a red-baiting "investigation" of the League, its members and leaders.
The action followed an attack by police on a grievance committee of fifty workers at the Glendale Area Relief Office Monday after the stubborn refusal of Miss Wayne Brace, director, to settle a growing list of grievances.

The enlarged committee of fifty was formed after Miss Brace consistently had refused to adjust grievances presented by a committee of six over a period of six weeks when the large group demanded action Miss Brace stalled for two hours and then attempted to leave for "lunch."
She was told by the committee spokesman that she must remain "until you perform your duty and see to it that we get what is coming to us." Mr. Smith, area director was called and proceeded to expose himself to the extent of calling police, when he became convinced the committee meant business.

Reason for the attack of relief officials upon the Unemployed League is seen in the fact that at least sixty grievance committees representing thousands of workers meet weekly with district relief directors, aiding workers to get relief and to settle grievances.
"The Los Angeles Citizen's Relief Committee for some time has officially recognized the Public Works and Unemployed League as the bargaining agent for the unemployed workers," David Price, head of the county-wide unemployed organization said in a vigorous protest against the attempt to discredit the union.
"Any effort—by inference or otherwise—to tie the PWUL in with racketeers, preying on the unemployed can only be interpreted as the first step in crushing the right of the workers to organize for settlement of their grievances." Price pointed out.
The IACRA had attempted to brand the PWUL as a "racketeering group" charging fees for settling grievances.

THOUSANDS JOIN MARCH
AT FUNERALS OF TWO
EUREKA PICKETS

Court Frame-Up
PEDRO PETE SELLS OUT
LONGSHOREMEN IN
HUMBOLDT AREA

EUREKA, Calif., June 27.—Three thousand workers, men and women, members of the labor unions of Humboldt County attended the funeral of William Kaarte, murdered lumber strike picket. In mass formation, led by J. B. Williford, President of Sawmill and Timber Workers Union No. 2563, of which Kaarte was a member, the unions marched from the Labor Temple in the funeral parade, through the streets of Eureka to the cemetery.

At 1:30 P.M., today, funeral services for Harold Edlund, lumber striker, who died Monday night from gunshot wounds received during the same police attack in which Kaarte was killed, were conducted at Union Labor Temple, and a second mass march of Humboldt County workers conducted his body to the cemetery.

A memorial meet for the two murdered pickets has been scheduled for Friday evening.

*** ILD On Job.**
At the request of the STWU local the International Labor Defense is defending the arrested workers. Elaine Black of the ILD attended a meeting of the local Wednesday night and was given the floor to speak. The workers applauded thunderously when she read a telegram from the ILD offices in San Francisco, pledging solidarity and unflinching fight to help them win their struggle.

Funds for leaflets, defense work and relief are badly needed in Eureka. The STWU local has practically drained its treasury during the course of the strike.

There was no court proceedings today against the arrested pickets on account of the Edlund funeral. First preliminary hearings began Wednesday, June 26, when 9 workers were brought up on rioting charges and one other on a charge of assault.

*** Frame-up Clear.**
Leo Gallagher, famous I.L.D. attorney appeared for the workers.

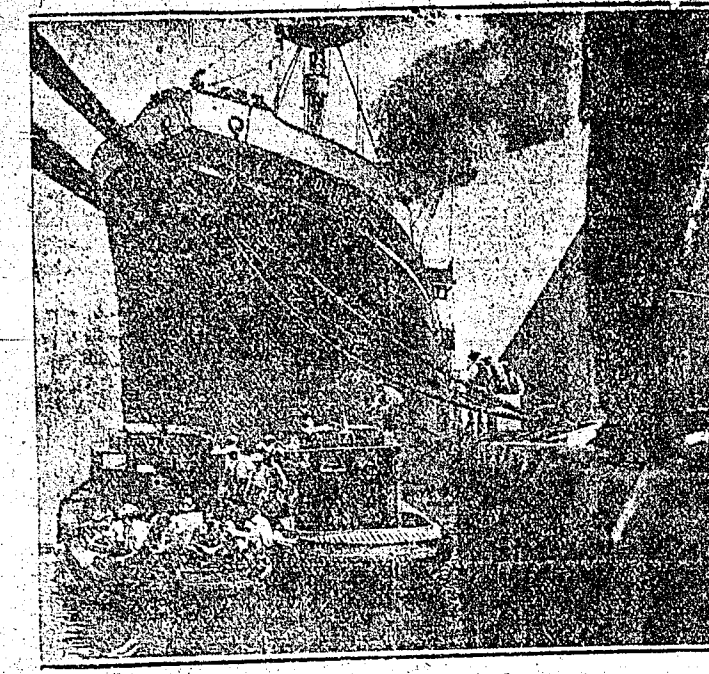
CHARGES OF "RESISTING
ARREST" DISMISSED
FOR DELLA DALE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Della Dale and five other workers, arrested March 25 at a street meeting at Ellis and Fillmore streets, were tried in Municipal Judge Lazarus' Court yesterday. The jury disagreed, 9 to 3 for conviction, and was dismissed.
Judge Lazarus had instructed the jury to bring in a verdict of guilty, stating that the "crime of refusing to move on" always applied "except in case of a public meeting," and the street meeting on that night, according to his honor, could not be called that.

Charges of resisting arrest against Della Dale, 54-year-old worker who was frightfully beaten in the patrol wagon and in the Ellis-Polk street station by police, were dismissed.
In addition, all charges against three of the workers were dismissed.

Date for a new trial, or dismissal of the case against the remaining three, should come in the near future.

Sperry and Bordeaux died that these men might have safe working conditions.

You were at work unloading a ship one day. The loads had been stepped up and fewer men in the gangs. The bosses were clamoring for more speed—more work. The men were exhausted from the long day. The men who fell and slanted the struggle for which they gave their lives.

The slander was not shouting "Communism," for there were Communists in the struggle. Many of the most loyal, courageous and self-sacrificing men in the waterfront unions were Communists.

Nicolas Bordeaux (Counsellor), one of the murdered men, was Communist Party member.

The slander lay in the charge that the Communist Party had incited the strike for the purpose of causing unrest; that the men were not struggling for better conditions but were merely seeking to cause trouble.

This was a conscious effort to bring the newspapers knowing well enough that the so-called "rioting" on the waterfront was nothing more nor less than a ruthless attack on the picket lines by police in a planned campaign to break the strike by terrorism.

San Francisco replied with two of the greatest demonstrations of working class solidarity ever seen in America: the funeral parade of the murdered men and the General Strike.

And the commemoration of their death will occur this year in the midst of struggle—the same struggle for which they gave their lives.

Events are moving rapidly toward a showdown. Employers have taken provocations by demanding that longshoremen accept the gains from the S.S. Point Clear. As rapidly as longshore gangs refuse the scab work they are blacklisted.

That is the situation as the commemoration of last year's "Bloody Thursday" draws near.

This much is clear. There will be a showdown. If it does not arise out of the present critical situation, it will come on or before the anniversary of September 30.

The whole future of organized labor on the Pacific Coast will depend upon the results of that showdown. When it is over, either the men will control the unions, or the employers will.

Either there will be real unions, or unions in name only.

In the Point Clear incident, the employers have struck at the most vital principle of organized labor, SOLIDARITY. It was solidarity that won the gains of last year's strike and solidarity that will be the deciding factor in the approaching showdown.

The mighty demonstrations of July 5 are labor's answer to the employers and to the A. F. of L. fakery. The unions will not yield a single one of their gains. On this day they will stand united in full strength and pledge their solidarity in the coming struggle.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 2.—Joseph P. Ryan, reactionary president of the International Longshoremen's Association, has admitted to his list of accomplishments.

In a telegram sent to a large number of Congressmen at Washington, D. C., Ryan protested against the Wheeler-Rayburn Bill, a measure designed to permit public ownership of utilities.

The Bill was defeated yesterday in the House of Representatives. The telegram, dated June 12, 1935, shows Ryan, who is battling to maintain the presidency of the I.L.A., agitating outside the rank and file, going outside the marine industry to throw the influence of a marine union behind his own private lobbying for the power trust.

Although there is little possibility of the Wheeler-Rayburn Bill ever becoming law, it is a measure which would benefit most by corrupt government officials and the working class. Ryan obviously is horrified at the implied suggestion in the bill that the trusts are not only to be broken up, but that the sacred cause of lobbying for the power trust, he condemns the very idea of socialist control of the economy under the present capitalist system.

THE IMMEDIATE DANGER OF WAR

It should be unnecessary to indulge in sentimentality to arouse a struggle against war. It is enough to apply to common sense.

Pacifist societies have adequately explicated the anguish of heart-broken mothers and war widows. The mountain of rotting flesh and bone heaped up by the last massacre has provided a thousand humanitarian materials for indignation and horror.

The economic basis of war, the greedy profiteering that masquerades as national patriotism, has exposed in a thousand learned treatises, so disillusioned are the masses with the mock heroism of war that the most sensational exposures of its corruption no longer excite their interest.

Murder, rape and war occupy parallel positions in the intelligent mind. That which is accomplished, what is needed now is a practical program of peace. Not a movement to combat the vague possibility of a war in the future, but a struggle to stop the practical war preparations which are going on right now.

There is no use beating about the bush. Let us say you have decided to carry your conviction to the point of integrity which means action. You have decided you are going to stop war. Who are you going to stop from doing what? Against whom is your action directed?

That is the raw fact that pacifists find hard to swallow. You are going to stop the government—from going to war. You are going to stop industrialists who manipulate the government from planning the nation to war.

This is no child's play. The very fact that you set out to prevent war means that there are powerful agencies that will oppose you. This means a nation divided. It is something like revolution.

April there was a nation-wide student strike against war. These students had to buck every agency of constituted authority. In many colleges they were brutally clubbed by the police. Many were arrested and jailed. All of them were called Communists.

Who clubbed and jailed these students? Can you call those agencies your representatives? They are the representatives of finance capital in the United States, the same agencies you come face to face with when you set out to prevent war. And prevent war, YOU MUST.

The issue is too serious now to relegate to mere talk. There are scores of organizations in the U. S. which are freely opposed to war. They have to make their opposition felt, expressed in articles, speeches, and a host of other ways.

Whatever other differences of opinion, political, religious, economic or otherwise may keep these groups divided, there is one issue on which they are firmly agreed. They are going to prevent war.

On this issue they must unite for common action. For political action through a United Front Labor Party. For mass pressure, demonstrations, public meetings and publicity through a United Front of struggle.

For economic action through close cooperation with the rank and file trade union movement. One of the best insurances against war is to have strong unions controlled by the workers themselves. The achievement of this, and requires your support and cooperation.

Aug. 1 is an international day of working class struggle against war and fascism. All over the world demonstrations, mass meetings and parades are being planned. This year, the workers are not demonstrating against a theory opposing their interests, but against a practical program that confronts them daily.

It is the business of every sincere organization or person opposed to war and fascism to join these demonstrations and make their powerful expressions of the anti-war movement in America.

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UNEMPLOYMENT STATISTICS GIVE LIE TO BALLYHOOD ON "STABILITY OF BUSINESS"

More Than 14 Million Jobs After Two Years of "New Deal"; Devaluation of Dollar Cuts Workers' Real Wage

NEW YORK, July 11.—After two years of the "New Deal," there are still 14,525,000 unemployed workers in the United States, according to a preliminary report of the National Research League, 11 West Eighth Street, New York City.

Employment was lower by 200,000 in March, 1935, than it was during the boomlet caused by dollar devaluation in the Fall of 1933. Meanwhile, the number of available workers has risen steadily so that the number unemployed is 1,200,000 higher than it was in October, 1933.

Capitalist newspapers at this time are attempting to make an end of the securities market business. According to the National Research Bureau, the apparent stability merely serves to cover conflicting trends existing in the economic structure at the present time.

By decree, President Roosevelt reduced the gold value of the dollar by 40 per cent. Indirectly this lowers costs, thereby increasing the price of manufactured products. There followed a slow, increasing rate of inflation, which, for the most part, allowed the larger number of paper dollars required to pay for the same amount of goods.

A large part of the export increase consists of automobiles. The increased purchase of automobiles has increased the employment of 65,000 more workers in automobile manufacture than last year. This increase is thousands more in steel mills, foundries and machine shops.

The net favorable balance of American business resulting from the small margin of export trade, represented less than 1 per cent of the total production of the country.

Police forces and slugs hand in hand.

The dollar devaluation had another effect—it resulted in lower purchasing power for those who work for wages. This can be simply as a result of the rise in prices of family necessities, a rise which continues to be in excess of the value of the dollar. The operation of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, with its criminal destruction and limitation of the production of food and other necessities also helped to raise prices—in fact it was devaluated, it is inevitable that wages shall not be increased correspondingly. If they were increased the effect would be offset by the corresponding rise in the cost of production.

The net result of this section of the so-called "New Deal" policy, therefore is that the workers are able to buy less food, less clothing, and less housing necessities than before. The effect of this is left in the minds of the workers, and an arrangement with the detectives, City Prosecutor Newton Kendall has set July 20 as the date for a hearing on the matter to determine whether criminal complaints will be issued against the "beef squad" members.

At the hearing, the "beef squad" will be asked to produce evidence that they are not engaged in the production of goods in industries.

The market for consumption goods has been depressed and this means that in time, less production goods for the market are going to be needed. To quote the National Research Bureau, "These internal actions tend to revolve in a downward spiral, the bottom of which is renewed crisis."

COMMUNISM AND TRADE UNIONISM

If the employers and the traitorous top officialdom of the A. F. of L. can defeat Communism on the waterfront, they will have the unions licked. The Industrial Association understands this clearly. A great many union men, however, are still confused on the point.

The unions take strike action against the employers to win decent wages and conditions. Promptly the employers set up a cry about "Reds" and "Communists." A great proportion of the men reply indignantly: "It's a lie. We're not Communists."

And yet, by your very action of waging an organized struggle against the employers, you are Communist. When you demand democracy in your union and the right to elect your own officials, you are demanding Communism. The very suggestion that workers should have a voice in the industry in which they work is out of Communism.

Why, in the first place, should you be afraid of Communism? Unless it is because your employer doesn't like it. He has good reason for not liking it. When you bring the daily attack in the capitalist press against the Communists, don't think for a minute you are listening to the voice of the public. You are listening to the voice of the employer and no one else.

If you are going to stay away from everything the boss points his finger at and calls "Communism," you might just as well stand your union and reconcile yourself to economic slavery.

An important crisis is coming in trade unionism. If the unions are under full rank and file control, they will command the greatest power in the land. They will be absolutely invincible. They would be able to virtually dictate their own wages and conditions.

Why do you suppose it is that William Green and the rest of the top officialdom of the A. F. of L. are so concerned about the press, although they supposedly command this invincible power, are unable to maintain decent wages or conditions for labor? It is because their purpose in the organized labor movement is to suppress labor, not to lead it.

The march toward rank and file control is growing apace in America. In it, employers fear their doom. They will stop at nothing to defeat labor's realization of its own power.

The fight against rank and file control is waged as a fight against Communism. And it is certainly true that the Communists in the unions are the outstanding champions of rank and file control.

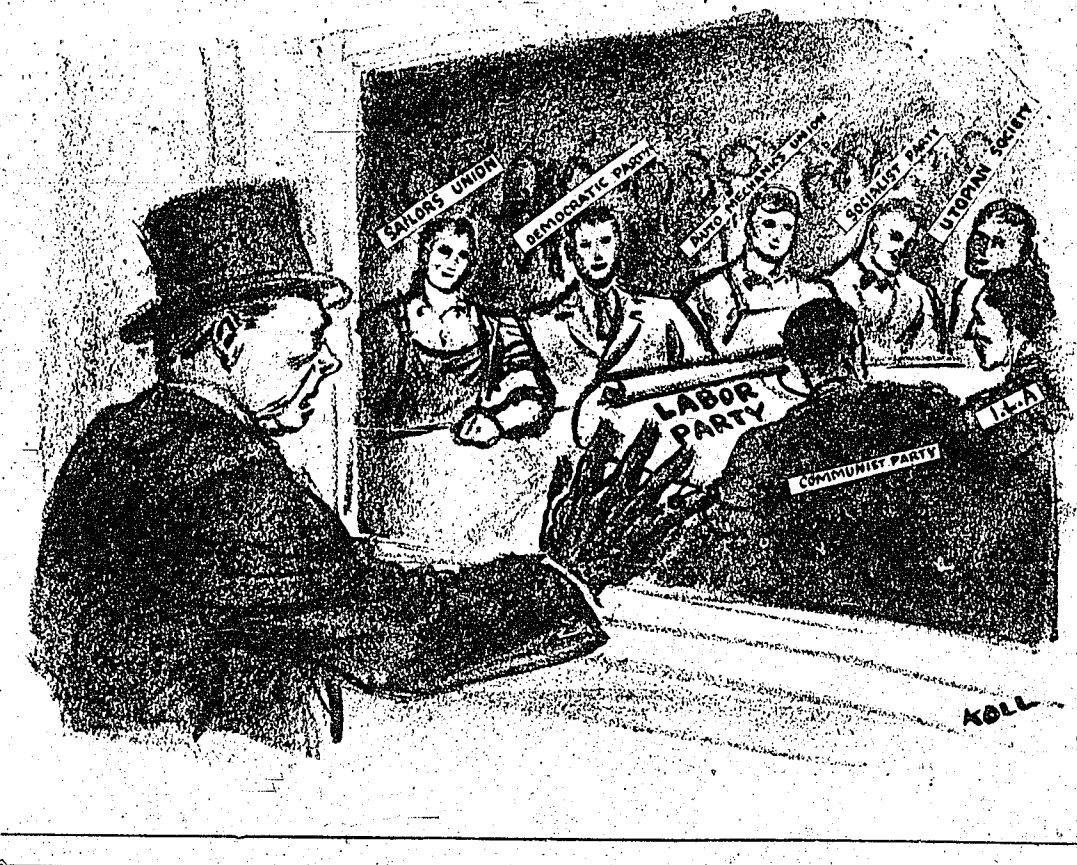
Re-instatement of Paul Scharenberg by the executive board of the International Seaman's Union is a challenge to the rank and file of organized labor. This corrupt official, expelled from the union by a more than two-thirds majority vote of the membership.

It doesn't mean he's back in. The rank and file will promptly boot him again. It does mean that a showdown is fast approaching between the workers and the buffer state of employers agents that comprise the top officialdom of the A. F. of L.

There must be no retreating in this fight. To the unions, it is a life and death issue. The reply to this challenge must not be confined to denouncing the Scharenberg expulsion. The booting out of other traitorous officials must follow. The ousting campaign must be carried through until every fake official has been driven out of organized labor.

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Another Hearst Liar Is Caught

Thomas Walker, Anti-Soviet "Expert" Jailed on Crooked Passport; Forger, Drunkard and Escaped Convict

During February of this year the Hearst papers were tarring out anti-Soviet lies, full blast. Mr. Thomas Walker, noted journalist and "student of Russian affairs," gave first-hand accounts of Russian conditions in the Hearst articles.

Since Mr. Walker devoted most of his talents to lies about Ukraine a careful checkup was made at the time, through Soviet travel bureaus, passport records, to discover how close he came to the actual scene of his stories.

It was discovered he went through Ukraine in about 12 to 15 days, and never came within hundreds of miles of the Ukraine.

Walker entered at Muske, near the Polish border, rushed to Moscow, and hurried across Siberia to Vladivostok, where he took a ship from the land of the Soviets. Even if he had traveled in a plane he would have touched the Ukraine and then crossed Siberia to Vladivostok, where he actually spent in the Soviet Union.

Walker's escape 14 years ago from the Federal House of Detention in New York, the remarkable Mr. Walker is not only one of Mr. Hearst's most prominent liars, but he's also an escaped convict, and a forger of no mean ability.

IT IS YOUR JOB TO PREVENT WAR

Time was when articles exposing the corruption of capitalism in its economic measures and war preparations required detailed analysis, charts, statistics and endless argument. Today, the fundamental facts stand so nakedly exposed they need no further comment.

Every capitalist nation is gripped by an economic crisis which they are helpless to cope with. Every capitalist nation has taken substantially the same steps, not toward a logical solution of the problems confronting civilization, but toward preserving capitalism at all costs. The trend in all capitalist nations is toward fascism, suppression of working class organization by armed power, and war.

At the same time, all these countries are confronted with powerful antiwar and antifascist movements within their borders. This is unprecedented in history. Only one country has previously been able to stop war and it took a revolution to do it. That was Soviet Russia. There the struggle for and against war evolved into a struggle between the working class and the capitalist class.

The anti-war movement in every capitalist nation has already taken this form—working class power against ruling class power. Middle class and professional people and organizations sincerely opposing war and fascism must necessarily join hands with the working class in their struggle, for here is the real power. The movement against war cannot be separated from the struggle of the working class for better wages and working conditions, for better relief, against frame-ups and oppressive legislation. Strengthening working class power in every phase is strengthening the movement against war.

August 1st, is a day devoted to this purpose. It is a day of working class demonstration against war and fascism in every section of the world, for this struggle is necessarily international in scope. The aim of this day is to unite the broadest possible representation of working class and sympathetic groups in common action.

The ruling owners, sponsors of both war and fascism, control every main medium of publicity—radio, press, screen, etc. If real public opinion is to be expressed, this must be done by parades, mass meetings and demonstrations, which can give the lie to the false public opinion printed in the capitalist press. It is in this manner that they can reach broader masses of workers and middle class people and draw them into organized struggle against the twin terrors, war and fascism which endanger all.

THE GREATEST PROOF

Charges of the San Francisco Industrial Association and the labor traitors in A. F. of L. officialdom, that Communists seek to betray the unions, has no greater refutation than in the eight Communist now serving terms of one to fourteen years in the penitentiary for organizing California agricultural workers and winning them better wages and working conditions.

There was an example of where there was no organization whatever before the Communists stepped in. Conditions in the agricultural fields had sunk to such a level that actual starvation and disease were widespread among the workers. The Cannery and Agricultural Workers' Industrial Union won vast improvements for labor, and these improvements cost the employees millions of dollars.

A war against Communism in the San Joaquin Valley was declared by growers, violence and legal frame-ups were used, and the union, to all practical purposes, was destroyed. Today the agricultural workers are reforming and preparing for a new struggle against intolerable conditions forced upon them. The "War Against Communism" cost these workers plenty—and they learned something from it. And their imprisoned leaders, Pat Chambers, Caroline Decker and others are a living symbol to them of what Communism means.

These leaders told with the utmost self-sacrifice and courage to build the organization. They faced the clubs and rods of vigilantes and hired thugs. Neither death threats nor self-offers could daunt them. When they were sentenced to prison on false charges of having sought to overthrow the United States government, they pledged absolute loyalty to the working class and determination to carry on the struggle when they got out. From their prison cells they have issued a call to the agricultural workers for renewed organization and struggle.

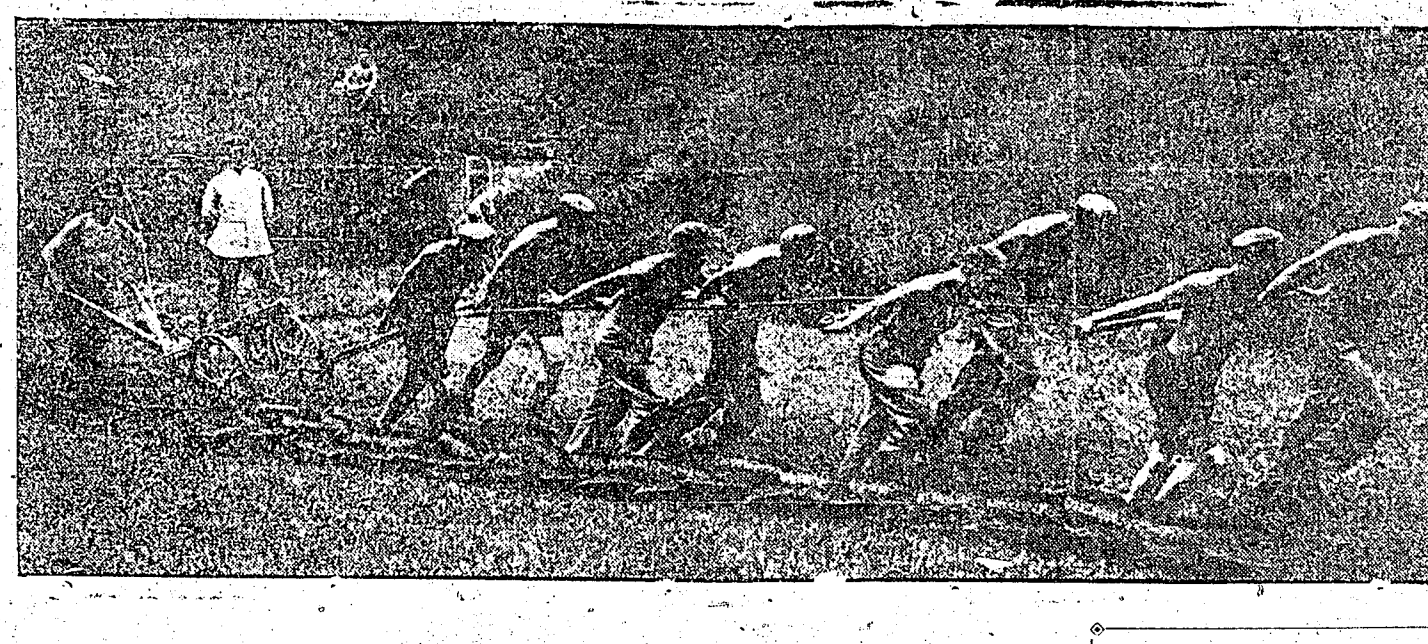

Works Progress Administration is Rushed in Order to Force Thousands Off Rolls—Is Most Brazen Wage-Slashing Program Yet to Be Advocated by New Dealers

San Francisco, July 25—The new wage scale automatically becomes not so much an individual wage as a family wage.

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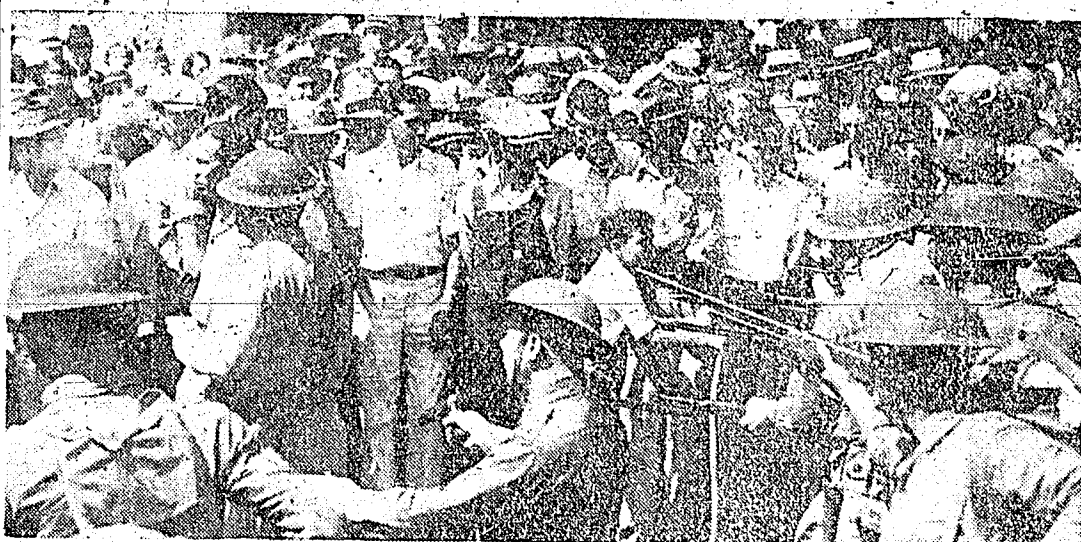

WHY WE MUST BUILD A LABOR PARTY



When troops are used against striking workers, it is an expression of the employer's political power. He controls practically every government office and can swing the machinery of the State to serve his greed. The employer's political power is the only weapon he has. If labor would elect its own candidates to office, the wealthy owners could be curbed in their use of troops and police forces for strike-breaking violence.

When workers walk out on strike all commerce stops. Their economic power is absolute. Labor has potential powers in the political field that are just as invincible. But, to date, this political power has never been realized.

Troops are now being used against striking unions in Terre Haute, Ind., and in the North-west lumber strike. The above scenes are from last year's wave of strike struggles.

WHOSE WESTERN WORKER IS IT?

The employers are now endeavoring to drive the Western Worker from the waterfront. Harbor police have chased our salesman from the Embarcadero. A few blocks away, he was arrested on the pretense that he was "obstructing the sidewalk."

Is this an issue between the Communist Party and the employers, or is it an issue between the waterfront workers and the employers?

There are two ways of looking at it. First, they are trying to prevent the Communist Party from selling its paper. Secondly, they are trying to keep the waterfront workers from buying the paper.

There is something in the Western Worker that employers don't want the waterfront workers to know. It isn't anything illegal, it isn't incitation to violence, it isn't lies. Otherwise they would be able to suppress the paper through ordinary criminal laws. They wouldn't have to resort to such cowardly pretenses as "obstructing the sidewalk."

The Western Worker is a six-page paper published twice weekly. Its publishing and distributing facilities are modest. On the face of it, the employers, commanding the greatest presses in the country, equipped with every possible facility, and publishing four daily papers in San Francisco, would appear to be in a good condition to meet the competition of the Western Worker. Yet with all these extravagant means of pleading their case, they frankly confess their inability to stem the tide of Communist thought. They print charts and statistics on the growth of Communist influence to illustrate their argument that the only way Communism can be suppressed is by violence. In this they make it clear that the logic of Communism is very sound.

Unable to intelligently compete with the Communist arguments, they are most anxious to silence the Communist voice.

The issue which arises at the present time is whether or not waterfront workers have a right to read what they please.

The articles in the Western Worker are written by American working men. The Communist Party of the U. S. A. is an organization of American working men, although workers of any nationality are welcome to its ranks. Waterfront workers have found in the Western Worker a medium through which they can reach their fellow workers with the truth about waterfront affairs and refute the lies printed daily in the capitalist press. Until the recent publication of the "VOICE OF THE FEDERATION", the Western Worker was the only paper in San Francisco that would print the truth from the workers' standpoint.

Employers know that if they can drive the Western Worker from the waterfront they are one step nearer to breaking the militant leadership of the maritime unions and herding the men into company unions under the leadership of employers' agents.

Waterfront workers have a right to read the Western Worker. Waterfront workers have a right to belong to the Communist Party.

Waterfront workers have a right to read whatever political or union literature they please, do their own thinking and make their own decisions.

These rights are being challenged by the waterfront employers. Are you going to defend these rights, or stand by and see them taken away from you?

The attack upon the Western Worker is a maneuver in the employers' campaign against the unions. Every attack upon the working class in the past five years has been disguised as an attack upon Communism. There is more truth in the claim than most realize. The whole purpose of the Communist Party press and Communist Party activity is to strengthen working class power both in the political and economic fields. The interests of the Communist Party and the interests of the working class are identical. When the majority of the workers realize this, they will understand exactly what the current campaign against Communism means.

MOONEY AND THE CLASS STRUGGLE

July 28th will mark the nineteenth year of Tom Mooney's imprisonment. He will spend that day at his regular duties as scullion in the officers' mess at San Quentin. Meanwhile, the workers of San Francisco will turn out in thousands to the giant Civic Auditorium meeting to honor his name and demand his freedom.

No event could better illustrate the history that is shaping in the United States today. The masses who will voice their indignation at the imprisonment of Mooney are at the same time voicing their condemnation of a corrupt and unjust social order.

Tom Mooney has always understood clearly just why it is that he is in prison. He knows that he was placed there by a class. He knows that his frame-up is one incident in the class struggle of America; the employing owners, the capitalist class, against the toiling majority, the working class. He was railroaded to prison for organizing the workers to demand decent wages and conditions and to enforce these demands through their economic power—the power to strike and bargain collectively.

Mooney also knows that his continued imprisonment is accountable to the political power of the employers who maintain control over every government agency. On this, the nineteenth anniversary of his imprisonment, Mooney sees the working class massing to express its strength in the political field—to challenge the most important power of the capitalist class—the power of the State. He sees this in the formation of a United Front Labor Party based squarely on the needs and interests of the working class.

In his nineteen years of confinement, Mooney has been joined by many other heroes. Men who were mere infants on the day Mooney went to prison, have grown up, carried on the struggle courageously, and are now serving time side by side with him in San Quentin.

During nineteen years he has watched the American working class groping to find its strength—to find the solution to its problems—the way to build a better world. Today he sees those issues coming sharply to a head. He sees the capitalist class sprawling in stupidity and brutality as its inability to rule becomes more glaring daily. He sees mass unemployment, hunger and poverty amidst the greatest productive forces on earth. He sees a nation divided and the line between the working class and the capitalist class growing sharper daily. He sees the working class growing stronger, more conscious of its problems, more conscious of its role in history.

The mass meeting on the 28th means more to Mooney than just a fight for his freedom. To him it means confirmation of his unwavering faith in the working class. It means that the cause for which he went to jail is growing stronger daily.

Anti-War League Exposes Fascist Terror In Eureka

Mayor Raves Like Maniac When Given Anti-Fascist Resolution By S. F. Delegation—Papers Controlled By Lumber Interests Attempt to Whip Up Vigilante Action

EUREKA, Calif., July 15.—A delegation of eight, representing the American League Against War and Fascism of San Francisco, Oakland, Redwood City, and Palo Alto arrived in Eureka Thursday, July 18th to investigate conditions of fascist terrorism in that city which had their inception on June 21 when police and deputized thugs fired into a group of unarmed pickets, killing two and wounding eight. The delegation arrived in Eureka too late to attend the hearings in the hospital in which Leo Gallagher, attorney for the "International Labor" Defense was successful in having the charges of "riot" dropped against four of the wounded pickets. The delegation, after interviewing many eye-witnesses to the police murder, drew up the following resolution, which was presented to Mayor Frank R. Swersky, the chief of police Littlefield, to deputy D. A. Bradford, and to the local press.

RESOLUTION
Whereas the Constitution guarantees to all workers the right to organize, strike and picket, and we find that these rights have been denied to the lumber workers in Eureka;
And whereas a reign of fascist terror has broken out in Eureka, a terror beginning in an unprovoked police attack upon the lumber workers which resulted in the death of two and the wounding of nine others;
And whereas a hundred and fifty strikers have been arrested and fifty-five have been held for trial on the framed charge of "rioting", which has been further proven by the fact that all evidence presented at the preliminary hearing showed the workers to be unarmed;
And whereas the police were armed with tear-gas, riot guns, machine guns, and pistols which had been bought without due appropriation of funds;
And whereas the whole atmosphere of the courtroom showed an utter disregard for the rights of the defendants, typified by the remark of the prosecuting attorney that it was "unfortunate" that the machine gun jammed;
And whereas homes of the strikers and strike sympathizers have been raided without warrant, strike headquarters broken into, union property confiscated and strike kitchens raided and closed;
And whereas police and company agents have attempted to sabotage the defense of the strikers and to frame militant workers on the basis of red hysteria;
Therefore the American League Against War and Fascism protests the fascist terror instigated by the Redwood Association with the support of police and other public officials, and demands the

immediate release of the strikers and sympathizers held for trial and the prosecution of police and deputized thugs who, acting as agents of the Redwood Association, are responsible for the murder of William Kaarte and Harold Edlund.

The delegation personally visited the Mayor in his office, handed him the resolution and expressed the feeling that it was a gross injustice to hold strikers in jail on framed charges of "riot" while allowing the police who did the killings to go scot-free. The mayor's eyes fairly popped out of his head, and his face flushed deep scarlet at what he termed this "insult." After shouting angrily for the benefit of his stenographer, he ordered the delegation to get out of his office.

On Friday evening the delegation appeared before the City Council. Again the Mayor lost all control of himself, shouted and raved like a madman. Directing his ire upon Eert Leech, leader of the delegation, he screamed again that he had been insulted, that this was another "Communist Plot," that the delegation were rank outsiders butting in where they weren't wanted. He repeated the police lies about the beating of chief of police Littlefield. His eyes having fallen upon the list of the National chairman of the League, he singled out the name of Lincoln Steffens. "Do you know," he screamed, "that this man's wife actually contributed money to the Communist Party?"
The Mayor having subsided, Eert Leech replied briefly and quietly setting forth the aims and purposes of the American League Against War and Fascism, showing that the League had come to Eureka because of the definitely fascist character of recent events in that city, that the League would give nationwide publicity to these

events and bring pressure to bear on those responsible for them.

On Saturday evening the League delegation conducted a street meeting in Eureka. Prior to the meeting, the local press, which is controlled by the Humboldt Lumber Company, came out with provocative articles and editorials, aimed to incite vigilante violence against members of the delegation and to prevent the meeting from being held. An editorial in the "Humboldt Standard" reads in part as follows:
"It's about time that people who come here to foment trouble were shown the way out of the city and told to leave in no uncertain terms. And this goes for those who are attacking Eordun under the name of Kaarte-Edlund Branch, International Labor Defense."

Nevertheless the street meeting was held and more than one hundred and fifty workers turned out to hear Eert Leech give an analysis of the outbreak of fascist terror in Eureka and throughout the country.
In its three-day investigation of conditions in Eureka the League found that the terror still continues. Vigilantes meet regularly and are attempting through intimidation to alienate support from the arrested strikers; not a single hall or church can be obtained for meetings to protest the killing and wounding of pickets and to oppose the attempted frame-up of workers on the charges of "riot"; reactionary union officials are conspiring with the police and the district attorney's office in an attempt to single out the militant workers among the arrested strikers and make them take the rap. But the rank and file of the union are not taking it lying down. They are fighting to oust these reactionaries among the union officials and in the face of terror are putting out publicity exposing the attempted frame-up of the arrested strikers.

The American League Against War and Fascism made many contacts while in Eureka and plans have been made to build a Eureka City Committee.

S. F. Labor Ticket PROGRAM

Union Pay, Adequate Relief, Civil Rights, and Democratic Government for Workers' Benefit Will Be Assured

On July 16 a Conference, representing thirty-seven organizations, met at the Building Trades Temple in San Francisco to plan a ticket in the coming municipal elections which would represent the workers of the city. The following is an attempt to explain more fully certain phases of the United Front Labor Ticket and what it can do for the workers of the city.

Question: Of what is the Labor Conference composed?

Answer: It is composed of those trade unions and liberal and radical organizations which vote to send two delegates to the Conference called to form the Labor Ticket. At the next Conference, to be held in August, an effort will be made to secure the attendance of the many organizations not contacted in time to take part in the first Conference.

Organization.

Question: What organization has been set up to handle the campaign?

Answer: The platform and candidates will be submitted to the Conference, which will have final say on such matter, subject to ratification by a city-wide convention to be held in the Civic Auditorium in September.

For the carrying out of the campaign, a campaign selection committee of one delegate from each participating organization has been set up. In addition, an executive committee of fourteen members will carry on the day to day work of the campaign.

Question: What can the Labor Ticket do for the workers of San Francisco if elected?

Answer: A Labor Ticket would represent the workers and would not call out the police to murder strikers, as the Rossi machine did in the marine strike last year. But beyond that, there are certain definite steps that would be taken.

Civil Rights.

A Labor Ticket would abolish all ordinances intended indirectly to deprive citizens of their constitutional rights. These include the ordinance passed May 11, 1935, restricting free speech in South Park, the anti-picketing ordinance, and the permit system by which through refusing permits

working class organizations are denied their constitutional rights.

A Labor Ticket would stop the unlawful tactics pursued by Chief Quinn's police. This includes, among other things, driving salesmen of workers' papers from the streets and wrecking working class halls, either by staying carelessly away while vigilantes do the job, or even actively participating in the wrecking as they did last year, when they directed traffic to help the things who were wrecking the offices of the Western Worker.

A Labor Ticket would insure union rates of pay and union labor on all municipal work, and on all relief work which the city had control of.

Democratic Government.

A Labor Ticket would guarantee a truly democratic government. All questions of public interest would be submitted to popular referendum.

A Labor Ticket would abolish discrimination on grounds of race, color, creed, or political affiliation.

A Labor Ticket would give children of unemployed, free transportation and hot lunches at schools, and also abolish the R. O. T. C. which is designed to instill a military spirit in the American youth.

Beyond the accomplishments of a Labor Ticket in the city, is the effect it would have on the state and national governments. Securing of adequate unemployment insurance, the soldiers' bonus, union pay on relief jobs will depend on the attitude of the workers of the polls. By electing a city Labor Ticket, the employers' agents at Sacramento and Washington will realize that they must support such measures if they are to retain their power.

ON THE LABOR DEFENSE FRONT

The hearings on the remaining white cases have been started in Eureka. Most of the cases are being handled by Leo Gallagher, I.L.D. attorney. (Contrary to the flamboyant defense claims made by the A.C.L.U.)

DOUBLE ORDINANCE

On Monday Sam Steiner was arrested on the waterfront for selling working class literature from a stand.

At first Steiner was told to get a permit to have his stand on state property, he permit was refused to a committee who applied for it. Steiner then moved his stand on to city property, and after fifteen minutes he was placed under arrest for violating city ordinance No. 916, which states that any person obstructing pedestrian traffic for one hour or more goes to jail.

Certainly this ordinance is not enforced in case of news stands that sell the Examiner and the Call-Bulletin. There are hundreds of these. However, the authorities don't mind the waterfront workers reading Hearst's lies about the USSR and about the real rank and file labor leaders in this country. But they certainly do object to having the workers read the truth about the class struggle, about the possibility of improving conditions for the workers by militant mass action, and about the self-outs perpetuated by such labor fakery as Ryan, Scharenberg and Vandeleur.

Steiner was bailed out by the I.L.D. The hearing was held in Judge Schoenfeld's court on the day this issue of the Western Worker was printed.

SACCO-VANZETTI ANNIVERSARY

Each year the I.L.D. holds a meeting commemorating the martyrdom of Sacco and Vanzetti. The framing of these two workers and their execution eight years ago horrified the whole capitalist world as well as the world of class-conscious workers.

Sacco and Vanzetti fought against the last great imperialist war, and they were militant leaders in the struggle for the rights of the workers. For this they were murdered by New England "forces of law and order."

Don't neglect this Herndon is valuable to the working class.

MORE ABOUT JACK CRANE

Now we learn that Jack Crane was not dismissed from the prison hospital at San Quentin because he was better. He was thrown out because he felt that the prison doctor wasn't helping him, and he asked to see an outside doctor. Moral, if you're going to jail, by all means be a forger, because that may get you employment with Hearst later on. Don't be arrested for participating in the class struggle, because you will not be treated as well as a white slaver or burglar.

Workers, and sympathizers, write to the Warden at San Quentin, asking that Jack Crane and the other framed political prisoners be freed fairly.

HERNDON MEETING SUCCESSFUL

One of the very important things about the Herndon meeting was that many people were there who are not connected with any official phase of the labor movement. We recognized several, so there must have been many more. Some of these people must be about ready to join the I.L.D., the League Against War and Fascism, and other affiliate organizations. The workers' fight is growing.

The Reverend Gordon McWhirter of the Unitarian Church gave an exciting account of the Youth Congress in Detroit, telling about the picketing of a Jim-Crow drugstore, in which he participated.

Angelo Herndon himself spoke brilliantly and sincerely. His dignity and intelligence are a credit for the working class movement, which is undoubtedly the reason that he was framed and tortured by the capitalist interest of Georgia.

Many petitions were signed, for the release of Herndon. However, in all 2,000,000 signatures are needed, and the quota for this state is 50,000, so we must get many more. If you don't know of any organizations that have these petitions for signatures, you can sign at the I.L.D. office, room number 410, 1005 Market Street.
