

U. S. RED CRITICIZES KHRUSHCHEV'S ROLE

Joseph Clark, foreign editor of the Communist party Daily Worker, believes that Nikita S. Khrushchev and his opponents in the Soviet Communist party must share responsibility for both the crimes and the achievements of the Stalin era.

He said in a column prepared for today's Daily Worker that it would be "fatuous" to suppose that Mr. Khrushchev and his remaining associates in the Communist party Presidium did not share some blame for the "Leningrad frame-up and the repressions of the Thirties for which they now blame Molotov, Malenkov and Kaganovich."

The ousted party members, Mr. Clark added, obviously were responsible for some of the achievements of the Stalin era.

He criticized in stronger terms than used by The Daily Worker yesterday the fact that the party "struggle was bottled up in the Presidium and the party's central committee."

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
